NET Academies Trust Curriculum Music

At NET Academies Trust, we follow the <u>Charanga Model Music Curriculum</u>/ <u>Charanga Original Scheme</u>, which has been crafted to align with the scope and breadth of the <u>Model Music Curriculum</u> introduced in March 2021 by the DfE. This curriculum serves as non-statutory guidance for teaching music, providing a comprehensive framework for music education. Schools within the trust that have music specialists are encouraged to adapt their curriculum to meet the unique needs and abilities of their students, allowing for flexibility and personalisation in music instruction.

Charanga New Model Music Curriculum

The Charanga New Model Music Curriculum, designed to align with the Model Music Curriculum introduced by the Department for Education (DfE) in March 2021, provides numerous benefits for children across NET schools. This alignment ensures a comprehensive, inclusive, and nationally standardised music education.

How It Works

The curriculum operates through an interactive digital platform, offering a variety of resources, including songs, activities, and lesson plans. This platform is accessible to both teachers and students, facilitating seamless integration into classroom settings or remote learning environments. The key focus on developing essential musical skills such as performing, composing, listening, and appraising provides children with progressive learning opportunities that build their musical capabilities over time. The wide range of musical genres and styles incorporated into the curriculum engages students and fosters a love of music through enjoyable and interactive lessons.

Organisation

The Charanga curriculum is organised with a detailed, year-by-year framework, ensuring a structured progression of skills and knowledge. Each year's lessons build on the previous year's learning, creating a solid foundation in musical education. Lessons are divided into modules and units, each focusing on specific musical elements such as rhythm, melody, harmony, and musical notation. This structured approach ensures that children develop a comprehensive understanding of music.

DfE's Model Music Curriculum

The Charanga curriculum mirrors the aims and objectives of the DfE's Model Music Curriculum, ensuring that students develop a deep understanding and appreciation of music. It offers a broad and balanced curriculum that includes singing, instrumental

performance, and listening activities, aligning with the DfE's emphasis on a well-rounded music education.

Furthermore, the provision of resources and adaptations to support students with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) ensures that music education is accessible to all students, reflecting the DfE's goal of inclusivity. Additionally, Charanga includes professional development resources for teachers, supporting them in delivering high-quality music instruction in line with the DfE's standards.

By implementing the Charanga New Model Music Curriculum, NET schools provide students with a rich, engaging, and comprehensive music education. This service ensures that students receive high-quality, tailored instruction that enhances their musical skills and broadens their educational experience.

Essex Music Service offers a wide array of opportunities and resources for schools to enhance their music education programs. Here are some key services and opportunities provided:

Whole-Class instrumental learning

The Play-It! program offers free instrumental lessons for KS2 students, covering a range of instruments and culminating in performances. Schools without their own instruments can borrow from Essex Music Service. Schools can access specialist tutors for whole-class settings. These tutors can adapt lessons for all levels and provide instrumental and vocal training, ensuring inclusivity by using adapted instruments and assistive music technology for students with special needs.

In-School Ensembles and Choirs

Schools can establish ensembles and choirs with the help of specialist tutors. These groups can rehearse during curriculum time or as extra-curricular activities, promoting collaborative music-making among students.

At Waltham Holy Cross Primary Academy and Nursery, we adhere to the Charanga Original Scheme to the new model curriculum for Years 3-6 in Spring/summer term. Reception will continue to follow the Original scheme alongside the EYFS Expressive arts and design outcomes. This transition ensures that our music education aligns with the non-statutory guidance provided by the DfE's Model Music Curriculum of March 2021. Our music curriculum is conducted for one hour each week, including music assemblies, offering consistent and structured musical instruction.

Musical Opportunities

At Waltham Holy Cross. we believe that music plays a crucial role in the development of our pupils. Our commitment to musical education is reflected in the wide range of musical opportunities we provide across all year groups. By exposing students to various musical instruments and vocal training from an early age, we aim to foster a lifelong appreciation for music, enhance their creative skills, and support their academic growth.

Our music curriculum is designed so that each year group is introduced to a variety of musical instruments, allowing students to explore different sounds, rhythms, and melodies. This diverse approach not only nurtures their musical talents but also enhances their cognitive and social skills.

Below is a detailed summary of the musical opportunities provided at Waltham Holy Cross Primary Academy:

The school owns all the instruments used in music classes, and they are taught by class teachers. The exception to this is the ukuleles, which teaching is provided by the Essex Music Service. This service is accessible to us through our collaboration with the Greater Essex Music Hub.

Our partnership with the Greater Essex Music Hub and the Essex Music Service is vital in supporting and enhancing musical opportunities for our pupils. This collaboration allows us to provide a rich musical education and a variety of experiences for the students. Additionally, through the Essex Music Service, we can offer free instrumental hire for a half term, further enabling our students to explore and develop their musical skills without the barrier of instrument costs. This seamless integration of resources ensures that our students receive comprehensive musical training, contributing to their overall educational experience.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Net Academies Trust

At Net Academies Trust, pupils are afforded extensive opportunities to enhance their musical skills outside of regular school hours. Through the Essex Music Service, parents can apply so their students can access instrumental tuition and participate in ensemble activities, allowing them to explore and develop their musical talents in a structured environment.

Furthermore, parents can request <u>Financial assistance from Essex Music Service</u>, making music lessons, instrument hire, and participation in county-led ensembles more accessible. This support ensures that all interested pupils have the chance to pursue their musical interests, regardless of their financial background.

Essex Music Service provides significant financial support, including a 66% discount on lessons for students eligible for Free School Meals or Pupil Premium. Additionally, Looked After Children and those with a social worker can access free music provision through the Essex Music Education Hub and Essex SEND.

During school holidays, Essex Music Services runs specialist holiday programmes, subsidised for SEND children and free for siblings. These programmes allow families and young people to participate together in music activities, fostering community engagement and continuous learning outside the regular school times.

For students looking for a paid, individualised musical instruction, parents should seek Rocksteady's 1:1 tuition service. This programme is designed to help children further their musical education within their school placement, providing tailored lessons that cater to the unique needs and goals of each student.

Waltham Holy Cross Primary Academy

At Waltham Holy Cross Primary Academy, students have access to all the musical services provided by the Net Academies Trust, including instrumental tuition, ensemble activities, and financial assistance through the Essex Music Service. Through Essex Music services we offer the children Piano and Guitar lessons. Working in collaboration with Rock Steady Music school we offer children in KS1 and KS2 a weekly session.

In addition to these offerings, the school provides a free weekly lunchtime choir club for children attending Young Voices. This service allows students to engage choral singing without any cost, fostering a love for music and community through regular practice and performance opportunities.

Children in Key Stage 1 take part in a weekly singing assembly developing their awareness of musical genres and styles as well as developing their listening and oracy skills.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

Musical Experiences at NET Academies Trust

All our schools across the NET Academies Trust organise and take part in a variety of events that bring our communities together and celebrate our students' talents and achievements. Among these events are the annual Christmas shows, which are eagerly anticipated by students, staff, and parents alike. These shows are a festive highlight that showcases the hard work and creativity of our students.

Another significant event is the Young Voices concert, where students join thousands of other children to perform in a large-scale choral concert. This experience not only enhances their musical abilities but also fosters a sense of unity and accomplishment.

Class productions are also a staple in our schools, including special leavers' productions for our Year 6 students. These productions give students from all year groups the opportunity to shine on stage, develop their performance skills, and create lasting memories.

Musical Experiences at Waltham Holy Cross Primary Academy

At Waltham Holy Cross Primary Academy and Nursery, Children are provided with opportunities to perform in various events and activities that engage students, parents, and staff.

Among these events, our Christmas shows stand out as a highlight of the year. These shows are not only a display of talent but also an opportunity for students to build confidence and for families to share in their children's achievements.

Another one of the key events that demonstrate our commitment to developing music in our community is the Young Voices concert. This concert features performances by Year 5 and Year 6 students and provides a platform for them to showcase their vocal talents. Participating in such a large-scale event helps students develop their musical skills, confidence, and teamwork.

In addition to the Young Voices concert, we have various class productions, including a special leavers' production. Each year group has the opportunity to put on a production throughout the school year, ensuring that every student experience performing and the hard work that goes into a successful show.

The children take part in various celebrations at Waltham Abbey Church throughout the year. Children perform hymns and carols alongside the local church community.

NET Academies Trust Objectives

Short-term objectives:

- Increasing music curriculum time to one hour a week each term
- Having at least one termly school performance
- Improving in-school co-curricular opportunities through the ensuring every NET school has their own choir/band.

Long-term objectives:

- Further children's cultural capital by providing a range of musical experiences across all NET schools. E.g. taking children to Royal Albert Hall.
- Carry out a NET show, involving all schools.
- Improve the use of technology to support children with creating their own musical pieces.
- Continue facilitating all schools to move onto new curriculum through Ks1 and Ks2 focused CPD's with Charanga.

Waltham Holy Cross Primary Objectives:

Short-term objectives:

- Upon return to Waltham Holy Cross, ensure all children receive consistent music teaching across all year groups.
- Provide children in Key Stage 1 a weekly singing assembly.
- Children in KS2 will be exposed to musical genres during assembly times.

Long-term objectives:

- Expose children to a range of musical genres and performances in assemblies and in class.
- Continue to make transition to the new model curriculum from Charanga in KS2.
