Massolit is a website that allows you to access several lectures from university lecturers about the literature texts we have studied. This will allow you to deepen your knowledge and understanding of the texts we have studied. You will complete a series of online challenges known as badges. By earning enough of these badges, you will receive an industry recognised award – which looks great on your CV. iDEA is the digital and enterprise equivalent of The Duke of Edinburgh’s Award.</p>

Food & Nutrition	<p>Produce a photographic portfolio of all the food products you have made ready to take to college. You could turn this into your own unique cookbook adding notes, ideas of your own modifications you could do to adapt the recipes. Practice your making skills breads, sauces, cakes and pastries are some starting points. Your outcomes can be photographed and put into your portfolio. If you can't get the ingredients to make, then I suggest you watch you tube clips on how different products are made and make notes.</p> <p>The 'Great British bake off' and Jamie Olivier's 'Keep cooking and carry on' TV programme is on every day. Free to watch on all 4.</p>
History	<p>For the next few weeks year 11 will continue to develop their skills for potential future A-Level studies by looking at a new topic area. Many sixth form and college providers in the local area select a range of topic areas for their A-level programme of study, with Germany, The Tudors and a selection of 18th and 19th century options being the most common mixture. Therefore, for the next few weeks we will be developing knowledge and skills by looking at the Industrial Revolution, as well as starting to research the social, political and economic changes occurring in Britain during the 18th and 19th century. Consequently, students will be asked to refresh their subject knowledge of this time period by looking at a series of clips, as well as being asked to make a spider diagram or notes about the Industrial Revolution, before then starting to look at an A-Level style booklet with a series of tasks within. A set of resources for the next few weeks will be saved in their class area on teams or sent via e-mail.</p>

<p>Core PE</p>	<p>Pick & Mix: Pick at least one or a mix of the following tasks.</p> <p>1. Find a 'Sport' documentary on Netflix or YouTube and write us a short review of it. Some ideas are: The Last Dance (Michael Jordan), Stop at Nothing (Lance Armstrong), Formula 1 Drive to survive, Sunderland til I die. That's just to name a few there are hundreds out there so find one that you are interested in and have a watch.</p> <p>2. Work-Out of the day (WOD) -Have a quick warm up & stretch. Make sure you are in suitable clothing and footwear. Ensure the area you are working in is safe from any hazards.</p> <p>Set your timer for 10, 15 or 20 minutes, see how many rounds you can do of the following exercises: 10 Burpees, 10 squats, 15 press ups, 20 sit ups, 20 high knees.</p> <p>How many rounds did you manage in your time set? How many times during the week have you attempted your workout?</p> <p>3. Running challenge: Set your timer for 6 minutes, go and run out for 6 minutes (somewhere safe & let an adult know or you could count how many laps of the garden or street you manage in the 6 minutes)</p> <p>Have a 3-minute rest and reset your timer for 6 minutes.
