Remembrance Day 2024



Remembrance Day, which is observed on the second Sunday of November each year, has its origins in Armistice Day, which is celebrated on November 11:

Armistice Day

Celebrates the signing of the armistice that ended World War I on November 11, 1918. The first Armistice Day celebration was in 1919 at Buckingham Palace, where King George V hosted a banquet, and a two-minute silence was held at 11 AM.

Remembrance Day

After World War II, the British government replaced Armistice Day with Remembrance Sunday to honour all British and Commonwealth service members who have died in conflicts since World War I. The date was fixed as the second Sunday of the month in 1956.

Poppies

The poppy became a symbol of Remembrance after World War I, inspired by the poem "In Flanders Fields" by John McCrae. Poppies grew in the fields of World War I and are still sold today for charity.

Remembrance Day is marked by ceremonies at war memorials, attended by veterans, members of the armed forces, and youth organisations.

This month saw the 10 and 11th of November. on Sunday 10th November was Remembrance Day were the country fell silent for 2 minutes to pay respect to all the fallen soldiers and animals of all wars across the globe. In school we had a 1-minute silence to pay our respects to all those men, women, boys and girls that unfortunately died and gave up their tomorrow for our todays. On Saturday the 10th saw King Charles III leading the Remembrance Saturday parade in London. – Chloe R

Recent Updates

Brazilian Grand Prix

Between the 1st and the 3rd of November, we had the Brazilian Grand Prix

Qualifying

Qualifying was postponed to the morning of the race due to the weather. In that session there were 5 red flags for 5 separate incidents where people were spinning into the barriers. The engineers were working overtime trying to get the cars ready for the race which was just 3 hours away. Alex Albon's car was not ready in time leaving an empty spot on the grid.

Race

On the formation lap, Lance Stroll spun into the barriers and then drove into the gravel trap beaching himself. Due to his car being stranded the formation lap was abandoned. The race eventually started with everyone behind the safety car. 30 laps in Carlos Sainz crashed into the barriers causing the safety car to come out, but during the safety car, Franco Colapinto spun around bringing out the red flag.

Results

The result was Max Verstappen with 26 points, Esteban Ocon with 18 and Pierre Gasly rounding out the podium with 15 points. The two Alpines don't usually finish in the top 10 so the podium is a very good achievement for Esteban and Pierre.





Las Vegas Grand Prix

Over the course of the last weekend (22nd, 23rd, 24th of November) we had the Las Vegas Grand Prix!

Qualifying

During Q2, Franco Colapinto crashed into the barrier at the tight corners of 14,15 and 16 leaving the Williams mechanics with a long night ahead of them. George Russel got pole ahead of Carlos Sainz with Pierre Gasly in 3rd.

Race

At the start Charles Leclerc overtook Gasly and Sainz on the inside to take 2nd place. Later, Pierre Gasly's car burst into flames as the car hit the RPM (revs per minute) limit. A similar thing happened to Alex Albon a few laps later. Nothing much happened later other than Max Verstappen being overtaken by the Ferraris.

Post Race

George Russel won with Lewis Hamilton in 2nd and Carlos Sainz in 3^{rd,} but the big news was Max Verstappen is a Four Time World Champion! He had to finish 3 points ahead of Lando Norris and he finished in P5 over Lando in P6.




Lifeburnt

At 11, the environment grew quieter and the fear rotted away, both of which linger to this day.



Technology



Apple is developing a new version of the iPhone SE, which is expected to feature some major changes. In addition to a new, larger size, Apple will also do away with Touch ID, and add support for Apple Intelligence.

The current third generation iPhone SE is Apple's smallest device, modelled after the iPhone 8. It measures in at 4.7 inches, and it is the only iPhone that includes thick bezels and a Touch ID Home button. That's rumoured to be changing with the next iPhone SE update, with rumours indicating that Apple has a new design planned. The fourth-generation iPhone SE will feature an all-display design like Apple's flagship iPhone lineup, with Apple eliminating the Touch ID Home button in favour of Face ID. The display is said to measure in at 6.06 inches, so it will be significantly larger than the current iPhone SE.

The next iPhone SE is expected to look similar to the iPhone 14, featuring a notch with Face ID biometric authentication instead of a Touch ID Home button. With the iPhone 15 lineup, Apple transitioned to USB-C instead of Lightning, and the iPhone SE 4 is also expected to include a USB-C port. While the iPhone 14 has a dual-lens camera, the iPhone SE 4 will include a single-lens camera to keep costs down, but it could have the 48-megapixel Main lens used in the iPhone 15.

Though rumours have suggested that the iPhone SE 4 will have a design modelled after the iPhone 14, Apple is expected to use the same rear chassis manufacturing process for the SE 4 that it used for the iPhone 16. Apple may also add a multi-function Action button to the iPhone SE, replacing the mute switch. An Action button first came to the iPhone 15 Pro models, but Apple added it to all models with the iPhone 16. It is not clear if the iPhone SE 4 will get an Action button, because a recent case leak did not depict a cutout for the button.

The iPhone SE 4 is expected to have the same A18 chip that's in the iPhone 16, which will allow it to support Apple Intelligence features.

Recipe of the Month

Parkin Loaf



Parkin is a cake, traditionally eaten throughout November, most prominently on the 5th of November to commemorate Guy Fawkes' failed attempt to blow up parliament.

Yorkshire parkin is usually made with black treacle, and Lancashire parkin with golden syrup, this recipe has a combination of the two!

The exact origins of parkin are unknown, but it was first referenced around the early 1700s.


Ingredients

- 100g butter (a bit extra for greasing the tin.)
- 100g light brown, soft sugar
- 100g black treacle
- 100g golden syrup
- 150ml milk
- 2 large eggs
- 125g plain flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 100g porridge oats
- 4 tsp ground ginger
- 2 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1 tsp ground mixed spice

Method

- 1. Preheat your oven to 180 °C.
- 2. Lightly grease a loaf tin with butter and line with baking.
- 3. Weigh the butter, brown sugar, treacle and golden syrup into a pan.
- 4. Set your pan on a low heat and let all the ingredients melt down to a dark syrup.
- 5. Take the pan off the heat and leave to cool (adding hot liquid to eggs will cook them and spoil the recipe.)
- 6. Measure the milk into a jug, crack the 2 eggs into it and beat lightly.
- 7. Weigh out the flour, baking powder, porridge oats and spices into a large mixing bowl.
- 8. The cooled treacle mix can be added to all the dry ingredients and given a good stir. Stir until you have something that looks like stiff dough.
- 9. Now gradually add the milk and egg mixture, bit by bit. (The mixture will look almost too liquid. It's going to be fine, don't worry.)
- 10. Pour the cake mixture into the lined loaf tin and put in the oven for 40-50 minutes. When you see the cake coming away from the sides and when you can put a skewer through its middle which comes out clean it's ready!
- 11. Let it cool in the tin on a wire rack as it is very brittle while hot. It will need to cool for at least 20 minutes before you can eat it.

At Walton-Le-Dale High School we are a proud advocate for British Values [Pictured Right]



World Events

Regarding the war in Ukraine, French President Emmanuel Macron and Sir Keir Starmer have declared that France and the UK will support Ukraine for as long as necessary "to thwart Russia's war of aggression".

Moldova formally protests alleged Russian election meddling Moldova has handed a note of protest to the Russian ambassador to Chisinau over alleged interference in its recent elections.

The foreign ministry in Chisinau said in a statement on Tuesday that it turned over the "note of firm protest" in relation to the "illegal and deliberate interference" to envoy Oleg Ozerov during a meeting at its offices. Moldova has accused Russia of seeking to influence its recent presidential election and referendum on joining the European Union. Russia has maintained that the votes were unfair and does not view Sandu as the legitimate president.

New Zealand's parliament was brought to a temporary halt by MPs performing a haka, amid anger over a controversial bill seeking to reinterpret the country's founding treaty with Māori people.


Remembrance Sunday in the UK


The Prime Minister marked Armistice Day at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Paris as a guest of Macron.




The Ultimate Burger Competition
