School Dinners

All children are entitled to free school dinners until the end of Year 2. Children are given a choice of meal and a pudding. They are supervised in the dinner hall by members of staff who ensure that all children enjoy their meal. We encourage all children to have school meals, not only as they are free but also a healthy choice. Milk and Fruit

Every child under the age of 5 qualifies for free school milk. Once children reach their fifth birthday, parents can choose to pay for their child to continue to have milk. Children are offered a piece of fruit at playtime every day.

Learning and the Curriculum

Reception is where a love of learning begins! In Opal Class, we have access to a wide range of resources both in our indoor and outdoor classrooms. The indoor and outdoor classrooms were both renovated in the past three years. We are very lucky to have a large amount of space and we encourage the children to make the most of it. Predominantly in Reception children learn through play and real-life experiences. Our teaching is delivered through carefully planned tasks and challenges in the classroom. Learning is recorded through observations and pictures.



Rainbow Room

A new addition to our school this year has been our sensory room which we have named the Rainbow Room. This room is used for lots of different groups and activities. It has a quiet space for children who



need some time to calm down and regulate themselves. There are sensory resources such as lights, sounds and textures. The room is also used for children who have been identified as gifted and talented where they can work together on projects such as computer animation.

Forest School

We spend at least one afternoon each week at our Forest School, on the school field. We have developed the area this year with new resources and equipment to support learning.



At Forest School our learning is child led, we follow our

interests and learn about the world around us. We enjoy looking at the pond, making dens, painting, building and playing. We go to Forest School in all weathers rain or shine you will find us down there.

This is only possible if we are dressed appropriately so all children





will need to have a waterproof suit, welly boots and a change of clothes in school each week.

As we are a Church of England Primary School, daily worship is an important part of the school day. We follow the Blackburn Diocese curriculum for Religious Education, which is mainly Christian in context, but includes studies of other



Parents as Partners

At St. Paul's we recognise the important role that parents and carers play in their child's education and development. As a primary care provider, you are your child's first educators and we greatly value any input, opinions and information you can share with us about your child's learning and progress.

To support this, each child has a 'Learning Journey' book and folder where we collect photos, observations, pieces of independent work and other artefacts that show what the child has been learning. Every Friday, after school, we encourage all parents to come and spend time looking through their child's Learning Journey and to talk about what their child has been learning that week. We find that the children are really proud and keen to show their learning to their parents and it is something they look forward to each week.

As a school, we use Class Dojo to share information with Parents and Carers. When your child starts with us you will be given a parent code that you can use to access your account. We will then be able to send



information about events in school and messages about your child directly to you during the school day.



We also provide other opportunities for parents and carers

to take an active part in their child's education. These include:

- Weekly Newsletters

- End of the Year Celebrations
- Sports day
- Parent workshops

Preparing your child for school

As your child will now be part of a class they will need to become more independent. It will make starting school much easier and happier if they are able to do as many things for themselves as possible.

What should my child be able to do?

Can they ... Dress and undress themselves? Put on and fasten their own coat? Use the toilet independently? Tidy up after themselves? Feed themselves? Recognise their own name?

School Uniform

Our school uniform consists of a burgundy sweatshirt printed with the school logo, a white button shirt and a burgundy tie. Footwear must be black shoes not trainers.

For physical activities children need burgundy shorts and a white t-shirt with or without the school logo. They can also bring black joggers and a jumper for outdoor PE on colder days. Children should have black pumps.

It is essential that all items of clothing need to be clearly labelled so that your child can identify their own items when they are changing for PE.

As our learning environment is both indoors and outdoors, children should have a coat with them every day and can bring a change of shoes for when they are accessing the outdoor provision e.g. wellingtons.



Things to bring to school

All children are given a book bag when they start school, this should come to school with them every day. Home reading books need to be returned to school every day so that they can be changed or children can be read with at school.

Children can also bring a water bottle.

Breakfast and After School Clubs

Before and after-school wraparound care can be provided by 'The Oaks', the childcare setting located on our school field. This will need to be arranged with them and not through school. Contact Numbers: 07815930160 or 07842549523



At St. Paul's we offer a number of after school clubs that children can participate in across the year. These run from 3:15pm until 4:15pm. More information will be provided each half term.

<u>General information</u>

<u>Attendance</u>

Please arrive on time for school at 8:45am to 8:55am so your child does not miss registration. If your child is late please bring them to the office so they can be registered for the day. If your child is not attending school, please ring school before 8:55am to inform us of the reason for the absence.

<u>Illness</u>

If your child is ill during the school day, then they will need to be collected as soon as possible. Please make sure the office has up to date contact details. Please keep your child off school if they are unwell. In the case of sickness, your child should remain at home for 48 hours after the last occurrence.

Medical appointments

It is helpful to know in advance about any medical appointments. Please inform the office if your child will be late or leaving early for an appointment.

Photographs and videos

We often use photographs and videos to record your child's learning and these are occasionally used on the school website or other forms of media. If you do not wish your child's photograph to be used please let the school know in writing.

<u>SEND</u>

At St. Paul's we are committed to the equal inclusion of all pupils in all areas of primary school life. We recognise the diverse and individual needs of all of our pupils and take into account the additional support required by those children with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND). We aim to provide a secure and accessible environment in which all of our children can flourish. We recognise the importance of working together to achieve the best outcomes for your child. The Special Educational Needs Co-Ordinator or SENDCo is Mrs Dean our Head Teacher. Class teachers can be approached if you have any concerns.

Open door policy

We operate an open-door policy at St. Paul's where parents and carers are encouraged to come and speak to staff when they have any worries or concerns. A member of staff is on the playground every morning and these are the first point of contact for any messages at the beginning of the school day. Alternatively, a message can be left at the office. At the end of the school day, class teachers are available to speak with parents and carers. Alternatively, parents and carers can be contacted by telephone if that is more convenient. It is important that any worries or concerns are shared with school so that we can resolve them as soon as possible.
