<b>Maths</b>	<i>To add by counting on</i>	Yr 1: Choose a number up to 20. Roll a dice (or use a dice generator online) to find your second number and count on. Write your number sentence, with the answer, e.g. $12 + 6 = 18$ Practise a few times!  Yr 2: Choose a number up to 100. Roll a dice (or use a dice generator online) to find your second number and count on. Write your number sentence, with the answer, e.g. $83 + 6 = 89$ Practise a few times!	Have a go at the Maths Problem of the Day on the website.	<b>Counting On Dominoes</b> Lay out some dominoes (if you don't have any at home, you can make your own, or look at some online – I have put a picture of some dominoes on the website that you could look at).  Have a go at counting on the numbers – do you prefer counting on from the larger number or the smaller number?
