


British Values



















Below are general statements relating to each of the British Values and how they are promoted through our Art education at Waterside. How British Value links to different topics across year groups is also outlined on the next page.

Through engaging with the pathways, each year group are given the opportunity to work collaboratively with their peers. This may involve taking votes, holding discussions and making decisions about their work and the work of others. During the 'Share, Reflect and Discuss' lessons of the pathways, pupils will learn to take into account the views of others and recognise that Art is a subjective subject and as a result can produce different opinions about the same thing.	Pupils will be taught how to use Art equipment safely and respectfully, following class rules during projects for the benefit of all. This is especially important in pathways that involve more craft based techniques and equipment where keeping themselves and their peers safe is of the up most importance. Children will understand that not following these rules will result in a consequence as per the behaviour policy.	Expressing individuality and developing preferences in Art is at the heart of the Art curriculum at Waterside. Through the pathways, children are given the opportunity to express their individuality through embarking on creative journeys where they can make their own decisions and choices in their projects within boundaries which the children respect.	Through recognising the subjective nature of Art, children will be expected to work in a way that positively impacts the work and productivity of others. When giving feedback, children do so in a way which is constructive and respectful to others' feelings whilst also recognising that we all have different preferences when it comes to Art. By understanding that everyone's creative journey will look different, children will develop a respect for their peers and the creative journey in which they undertake. Children will also experience a variety of traditions and festivals through the Art curriculum and develop a respect for these.	Children understand that people have different views and opinions in Art and that these make them who they are. Through learning about and experiencing art and design work from different faiths and cultures around the world, children will apply a positive attitude when working with those who have different faiths and beliefs. Studying artworks and traditions from other cultures and times, allows children to appreciate art in a wider sense and also appreciate the culture, faith and time in which the art originates.


