Latin is allocated forty minutes per week. including in English, Reading and Spelling sessions in Key Stage Two.



<u>Implementation (continued)</u>



Having awareness and understanding of the wider world and our place in it is vital to our Latin ideology, where each unit contains a lesson which is planned meaningfully to enhance learners' appreciation of other cultures, including ancient civilisations.



Interactive Lessons

Latin lessons involve a range of activities including games, simple drama activities and songs. This allows ample opportunity for children to learn through a variety of strategies and to embed key concepts into children' long-term memory through repetition in a variety of means.



Strong Vocabulary development

The Minimus cartoon presentation will be used to develop children's language as it builds from previous language and provides regular repetition of key words, phrases along with masculine and feminine verbs and adjectives. Latin has been chosen to allow for exploration of etymology and morphology alongside a stronger focus on developing children's language and vocabulary acquirement.

inguistic Progression

The programme develops knowledge of grammar concepts and language incrementally, building upon previous knowledge, increasing complexity and introducing new concepts term-by-term. These include: declension and function of Latin nouns, conjugation of Latin verbs, the usage of Latin adverbs and adjectives, the use of prepositions, the role of gender in Latin language.

Reading in Latin

Enhancing children's vocabulary and promoting a love of reading and language is at the heart of our Latin curriculum. Children have the opportunity to read Latin through a range of texts including, but not excusive to: stories, reports, storyboards, mythical
