Clearly structured learning

Across Waterside Primary, Music is taught by our class teachers. Waterside Staff make use of the well-known *Charanga* scheme of work to support them in delivering Music lessons effectively. This scheme is aimed to support non-specialists, and our Music leader has selected units of work that are appropriate for each year group. As part of our curriculum, children have the opportunity to participate in singing and the playing of a range of instruments. Timetabling

At Waterside Primary, Music is allocated forty minutes per week. However, singing takes place outside of Music lessons including in our weekly singing assemblies. termly productions and purposeful opportunities throughout the curriculum. Children are exposed to listening to a range of music whilst working in class, and even when walking through our corridors.



<u>Implementation (continued)</u>



Strong Foundations

Music is an essential part of learning in the Foundation Stage as it is incorporated in everyday learning. Music is taught in accordance with the objectives set out in the Expressive Arts and Design strand. Children enjoy singing simple rhymes, songs and chants. They also explore instruments and learn how to make sounds.

Music in KSI

In KSI, the children are taught to use their voices expressively and creatively by singing songs, speaking chants and rhymes. They begin to play instruments with appropriate control, following a conductor's instructions in some instances. Children also have the opportunity to compose by experimenting with and combining instrumental and vocal sounds.

Music in KS2

In KS2. pupils are taught to sing and play musically with increasing confidence. accuracy and expression. Lessons are practical and children become confident in recognising and playing musical notes. As children move into UKS2, they begin to learn more about the history of music, music from around the world, and the work of great composers and musicians past and present.



Song in School Singing in school can be heard outside of Music lessons. During our singing assemblies, children sing a range of songs which are practised and refined each week during a 30-minute phase assembly. Children singing during these assemblies allows them to see the joy and mental wellbeing that music can produce. linking with our PSHE curriculum.

Use of Instruments

At Waterside, children have access to high quality instruments. Within lessons, children explore percussion instruments to accompany singing or to create their own musical pieces. In addition, the use of class sets of glockenspiels and recorders allow children to learn musical notation in age-appropriate ways. The children of Waterside leave KS2 familiar with a range of instruments and musical notation that will prepare them well for KS2 music.





Our Teachers

Waterside teachers have experienced CPD training in how to teach Music successfully. They are confident in the use of the Charanga music programme to support the teaching of Music, including using vocabulary and skill progression to build upon prior knowledge.



School Choir

In KS2, children have the opportunity to learn join our school choir. This is led by our Waterside staff and children have the opportunities to perform both in and outside of school. School choir is very popular and there are often many members.



Wider Opportunities

Children have the opportunity to participate in Young Voices performance, which gives children the experience of performing in arenas with thousands of other schools and acknowledge the cultural capital surrounding the subject of Music.



Reading in Music

In KS2. children have opportunities to read about composters or types of music. Non-fiction texts are available in the library to be used in lessons and children can access these.
