Welcome back to the start of a new term and a new school year!

It's been an interesting first week back in terms of our new **higher expectations** agenda, and I want to start by addressing that immediately. Thank you very much to those parents who have taken the time to contact us and thank us for the changes to our behaviour systems in school. We gave you an overview of those changes at the end of last term, but we explained them fully to students this week in our assemblies and they started on Monday. This was in the very clear context of raising our expectations around standards in school - behaviour, punctuality to school and lessons, uniform and positive relationships. I am delighted to say we have seen an immediate improvement in behaviour and learning in classrooms - teachers are very pleased with our new approach and learning has been very positive as a result. Most of our students get it right every day and we recognise that! Rewards will again be a key focus this year for those who get it right.

Equally, our new, enhanced uniform expectations has been an issue for a small number of students. We started the week with around 50 students (that's around 4.5% of our population) incorrectly dressed and - as the week has progressed - we have reduced that to a minimum number. I know we have upset some children and parents in the process, but I am unapologetic on the need to improve our standards there. It makes a difference in setting the right tone within school, and it's something we have to work on every day as a school community.

A welcome to parents and carers of our **new Year 7 students**. Year 7 have made a very positive start and their worries about getting lost have - as usual - not been an issue in the main. I have received very positive feedback from teachers and they have settled in well.


Final Examination Results 2022 - COVID19 could easily have been used as an excuse for our ex-Year 11 students in terms of their achievement. We know how hard they worked last year to make sure they were not disadvantaged, and I was therefore delighted that they achieved some very pleasing results that allowed them to progress to the next step in life, whether that be college, apprenticeship or a career step.

Our results continue the upward trend of the school's performance, and we were keen this year to measure our results against the last set of examinations in 2019. As you will see below, they showed real improvement across the board. So well done to all of our students and their teachers!

17% of all grades were the highest grades of 7-9. The core subjects were supported by a whole range of other subjects, and our trend in almost every subject was an improvement from 2019. We also saw large improvements for our middle and lower ability learners in particular.

And our attention moves towards our new Year 11 students, who have the task to match and even beat them! A vital year ahead. As I said to Year 11 on Monday, attendance and hard work are the keys to GCSE success. If they take the support and opportunities on offer, they could also be achieving the very highest grades.



Home Learning - Homework

Parents will be able to see the homework that has been set for their child by using the Edulink App. Simply click on the Homework icon at the "Circle page" and you will be able to see the homework that has currently been set for your child. There is also an option to see the homework that has been set for your child in the recent past.

Students can discover information about the homework they have been set in two ways. They too can use the Edulink App and can see the homework that has been set by clicking their Homework Icon. The second way is through Google Classroom. Your child should log onto their Google Classroom and can then look inside each of their classes to see the homework that has been set.

Year 7 Homework: Due to an issue with the Edulink App software Year 7 homeworks were not showing on the Edulink App. This has now been resolved and homeworks for

Year 7 should now be showing. Year 7 can still access their homework on Google Classroom as normal.

Attendance Matters-Working Together to Improve School Attendance

The Attendance Team would like to thank you all for the fantastic start to this week with almost 1000 students having 100% Attendance! Your support for their education is invaluable and the benefits they gain from being at school every day cannot be underestimated. Guidelines make it very clear the irreparable damage absence from school has on a child's life chances: If a child's attendance falls below the 90% guideline for persistent absence then this equates to 20 days absence from school, which potentially is 100 lessons missed and the equivalent of one academic year of English, maths or Science lessons. Parents may not be aware of the cumulative effect of the absence. **Our attendance team is always on hand should you need any support with your child's attendance at school please see the website for contact details and further information Attendance Webpage.**
