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What does this journey look like?



Year 7 and 8 students will follow a curriculum of:

English, Maths, Science, Computing, MFL, Technology, Humanities, Expressive Arts, PE, Music, Life Learning.

Studying 25 lessons a week, 5 lessons a day.

They will have:

- A broad and balanced curriculum
- The opportunity to begin developing the knowledge and skills for the foundations of GCSE success.



What does this journey look like?



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- Towards the end of Year 8, students will then select the options that they would like to study to GCSE.
- Year 9 is seen as the foundation year to GCSEs. They continue the good work covered in years 7 and 8 and look at what further skills are needed to be GCSE ready.
- In Years 10 and 11 students apply the skills and knowledge to the GCSE content in more depth.
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**Education has Changed!** 



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
Over the past few years education has seen the introduction of new, more challenging GCSEs. Your child will be sitting the new style GCSE for all of their subjects.

**Tracking Progress** 



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
How will we track your child's to ensure they continue to make progress and how will we communicate that with you?

All students arrive to Werneth with their KS2 Scores from their SATs, we use this information to calculate their likely outcomes at GCSE. This is the minimum we would expect them to be achieving if they are continuing to make good progress.

What should progress look like? We will report this information each term via their school report.

### **Reporting Progress**

#### Understanding your child's report

#### What should I achieve as a minimum at the end of year 11?

This report includes a minimum grade range your child is likely to achieve at the end of year 11, based on their prior attainment. These outcomes are generated by using your child's KS2 primary assessments as a starting point and are just a guide- students might achieve above or below these grades.

The expected outcomes are grouped into three groups:

Grade groups
KS2 points score indicates a minimum of Grades 6-7 at GCSE.
KS2 points score indicates a minimum of Grades 4-5 at GCSE.
KS2 points score indicates a minimum of Grades 2-3 at GCSE.

#### Am I on track to achieve it?

At KS3 we use these grade ranges as a guide. Through various and rigorous assessments teachers look at how likely **your child** is of achieving the set of grades at the end of year 11. On the report this is shown as + = and -

Attainment	
Above	Indicates the student is working at a standard that exceeds expectation
On track	Indicates that the student is work at a standard to meet expectation
Below	Indicates that a student is not currently working at a standard to meet expectation

### Attitude to learning

Each report from school will incorporate an attitude to learning (ATL) grade. As you know a positive attitude to learning and self-discipline greatly affects students' progress. Where ATL is below basic expectation (orange or red) the teacher will indicate with a tick the area(s) of concern. You may wish to have a conversation with **your** *child's* teacher regarding this.

If a student is working as we expect the average ATL will be 1.
