<u>3 Key Facts</u>

- 1. At the start of the play, Romeo is presented as a peaceful and romantic character.
- 2. Romeo changes and becomes aggressive after Mercutio's death in Act 3.
- 3. Romeo responds immaturely to being banished. However, Romeo responds maturely to Juliet and Paris' deaths.

Key Quotations

"Good Capulet - which name I tender as dearly as my own - be satisfied"	In Act 3, when Tybalt is trying to provoke Romeo to fight by insulting him, Romeo continues to refuse to fight.
"Mercutio's soul is a little way above our heads either you, or I, or both must go with him"	In Act 3, Romeo becomes very aggressive and threatens Tybalt. In an instant, Romeo changes from being obsessed with love and celebrating his marriage to Juliet, to threatening to murder her cousin.

The Most Important Questions

How does Romeo respond immaturely to being exiled?	Romeo says that he would rather be dead than banished as he will not be able to see Juliet again.
How does Romeo respond immaturely to the Nurse telling him Juliet is upset?	Romeo's first thought is to kill himself. Friar Laurence has to tell him to stop and think of Juliet's feelings.
How does Romeo respond maturely to Juliet's 'death'?	Romeo says that the only thing he wants is to be with Juliet. He decides to commit suicide so he can be with her.
How does Romeo respond maturely to Paris' death?	Romeo makes the mature decision to honour Paris' last request by laying Paris' body next to Juliet.
