Class News

Cygnets and Pufflings

A fabulous week in Reception. We have writing the story of Little Red using the story friends. We used our Phonics to write some super sentences and have tried to use language from the story. In Maths, we have been exploring and comparing length and height. We have also started to learn about time and the days of the week. We have really enjoyed measuring and comparing the items using key vocabulary; short, long, shorter, longer. In our topic, 'Once upon a time' we have been comparing homes into the past to homes now. Some of us were shocked to learn that there was no electric or central heating!

Goldfinches and Woodpeckers

Another fabulous week in year one this week!

In literacy the children have been using the suffix 'ing' 'ed' and 'er' to write a character description about a Wild Thing at the Wild Rumpus. The children are starting to use alot more interesting vocabulary in their sentences and we are really proud of them.

In maths we have moved onto our length and height unit. The children have been introduced to the different mathematical language linked to length and height and they have started to measure things in the classroom using non-standard units of measure.

Art was fun this week and the children made 3D drawings by exploring and making different shapes with paper.

In geography the children were investigating daily weather patterns. We made our own weather chart and had a go at presenting the weather incorporating the different compass points that we have learnt.

In computing the children put the final touches on to their E-Books and then we shared these onto a class display board so that we could read each other's stories.

Owls and Robins

This week in Literacy, the children have been busy 'analysing' our WAGOLL 'An Adventure with Grandad'. The children have looked closely at how authors use different language techniques - eg apostrophes to show possession, expanded noun phrases, questions, exclamation sentences ... The children have also considered the feelings and actions of the main character 'Syd' who, eventually, leaves the Island without his beloved Grandad. Finally, in preparation for their 'hot task' next week, the children have been practising writing a character description. The character descriptions were full of creativity and flair, making us excited for the writing that will come next week ...

In Maths, the children have impressed us with their understanding of division! The children have looked at how to divide by making groups and sharing. Can your child recall how to work out the answer to $18 \stackrel{\textcircled{\label{eq:1}}{=}}{=} 2 = _$ knowing that that $2 \times 9 = 18$?

In Science, we thought more about Seasonal Change and focused on Spring! The children learned about different types of weather in Spring, the plants that appear, which animals come out of hibernation and what happens to deciduous trees!

Another messy session was had in Art this week - which the children thoroughly enjoyed! We explored texture and how to create this using different household objects. The children were given a word - e.g. 'rough' and had to choose and paint with an object that would then create this texture! Can your child recall any of the other words they had to make a texture for?

In PSHE, the children have been learning another way to keep themselves healthy - through safe medicine use! The children discussed different types of medicine and the rules for how / when to use medicine safely. The children had an excellent understanding of this and created some informative posters to demonstrate their knowledge.

In Geography, the children have continued their topic 'Why is our world wonderful?' looking a lot closer to home than in previous lessons where we have explored wonders of the world ... this week the children looked at what is wonderful about the local area in Sandbach! First, the children learned about maps and symbols. Then, they looked at an aerial image of Sandbach town and picked out key features e.g. library / church / park. Then, using the same image the children created their own keys and maps of the area! The children really enjoyed this and produced some fantastic maps!

In RE, the children learned about Palm Sunday and had fun role-playing the crowds in Jerusalem waving their palm leaves to celebrate Jesus' arrival!

Well done for another wonderful week Year 2! Have a brilliant weekend!

Sandpipers and Moorhens

Year 3 have had a fabulous week this week.

In Literacy, they have completed their hot write. They have written a mischievous narrative based on the book 'Seen and not Heard'. They have loved this book, especially because it is all about children doing mischievous things! Their writing has been very creative and they have impressed us with their imagination.

In Maths, we have finished our unit on fractions. They have done lots of work on equivalent fractions and used bar models and number lines to support their working out.

In DT, the children had an exciting lesson learning some life skills of peeling and chopping. Hopefully they can showcase their new skills at home when helping to cook dinner.

In Geography, the children are continuing their learning on Antarctica. They have enjoyed learning that nobody permanently lives there, and have immersed themselves into the life of a researcher. They wrote postcards home imagining they are a researcher, and thought about the difficulties they may face.

The children have also been practising their touch-typing skills in Computing. This is a skill I am sure lots of them will need as they go through their lives.

Lastly, the children have really enjoyed the gadget shop this week. A huge thanks to all who sent money in with their children to help to raise funds for the school.

Kingfishers and Lapwings

We have had a wonderful week of learning this week, and we have celebrated science week with some exciting lessons! First of all, we focused on the theme of change and adaptation, with a STEM lesson where we thought about the adaptations that animals had made (such as a bird adapting to fly more efficiently through evolution) and then we made airplanes and adapted them to be able to fly. We then joined in with a national, interactive science lesson all about farming and the adaptations farmers have made on their farms. Ask us about this and what we learned.

In Literacy, we have now started writing our return narrative - ask us about this and what a return narrative is! Earlier on in the week, we wrote about a character who visited a city for the first time, and we thought about how he could show his feelings through his actions. In maths, we have been learning all about fractions, and converting improper fraction to mixed numbers (and vice versa) and finding equivalent fractions.

In geography, we have been learning all about the rainforest and this week our focus was on the people of the rainforest. We learnt what an indigenous person was and how they use the rainforest for food and shelter. In music, we created our own composition with inspiration from In The Hall of the Mountain King by Edvard Grieg, thinking about making a scary melody and a footstep beat.

Finally, in DT this week we are thinking about designing packaging and who our target audience for our delicious biscuit is going to be. We will also have a budget for our biscuit and decide what ingredients we can purchase, and exciting toppings/additions we can use to make them as tasty as possible!

Eagles, Hawks and Kestrels

This week in maths, year 6 have continued to explore algebra and using formula to solve problems. Year 5 have moved on to a shape and space unit.

We have been looking at the perimeter of shapes.

In literacy, we have completed our hot writes. The children have found this unit a little tricky but have persevered well. They have tried to express the character's determination to conquer Antarctica.

In science, the children learnt about how a foetus develops. We also enjoyed a live lesson, as part of science week, where we saw a cow and sheep being born. I'm geography, we learnt about the uses of the ocean including trade routes for import and export. During RE, we discussed if it was Jesus' destiny to be crucified- a really tricky concept. In French, we have learnt how to say he wears, she wears and I wear.

The children have picked this up well. In art, we have looked at the art of Hockney and Rego to study how they create their unique prices.

We have had a lovely week and really enjoyed the gadget shop during break and lunch. We have missed the sunshine. Let's hope it reappears this weekend. See you on Monday I and S an

They are not for Local Authority processes (e.g., EHCPs or placement changes) or child assessments. Examples of topics include: Concerns about speech development • Manging challenging behaviours • Social skills or play difficulties • Ansiely or school -rateded issues • Preparing for adulthood


