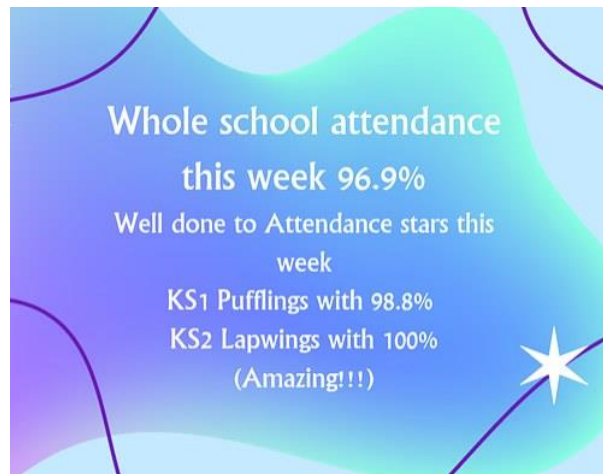

This week, we have been celebrating **Neurodiversity Celebration Week** - recognising and valuing the many wonderful ways our brains think, learn and experience the world.

On Monday afternoon, Mrs Whitehead led a wholeschool assembly to launch the week and explain why Neurodiversity Celebration Week is an important time for us to recognise every individual's strengths. Throughout the week, children explored what makes each of us unique, researched inspirational neurodivergent people, wrote poetry, and learned about equality and equity.

## Class News

### Cygnets and Pufflings

What a lovely sunny week ☀️! We have made the most of the sunshine with lots of outdoor learning through play, during our choosing time.

In Drawing Club this week we have shared the story, Once There Were Giants and the children have thought about what they would like to do when they grow up...we had vets, singers, gardeners, astronauts, mechanics, queens and kings!

In Maths this week we have focused on counting larger groups of objects and some of the strategies we might use to help us with this - moving the objects if we can, lining them up, or crossing them out. We have been practising counting to twenty and beyond, really focusing on saying the teen numbers correctly - see if your child can show you at home.

Our topic work has been very varied this week - we began with schools in the past, then moved on to how we are all different (linked to neurodiversity week) and finally started to look at the Easter story!

Have a wonderful weekend, ready for our final week of term - which includes our class assembly, which the children are very excited to share with you 😊.

### Goldfinches and Woodpeckers

What a wonderful week we've had in Year 1!

Our highlight was definitely our trip to Peak Wildlife Park. The sunshine made it the perfect day for exploring, and the children were absolutely delighted to see such a wide range of animals. The lemurs were a firm favourite—they were incredibly friendly, and the children loved watching them leap and play all around us!

Back in school, we have begun our NFER quizzes, and we are already so proud of the children's efforts. They have shown fantastic knowledge in Maths and approached each task with confidence and determination.

This week we also celebrated Neurodiversity Week. We spent time thinking about how everyone's mind works differently and explored the idea of being kind to minds of all kinds. The children shared thoughtful ideas and showed great empathy during our discussions.

In English, we have started writing up our hot writes all about our wild things. The children have been working incredibly hard to use exciting and effective vocabulary—our classroom has been full of creativity and imagination!

Well done for a brilliant week, Year 1! We are very proud of you all.

## Owls and Robins

In Literacy this week, the children finished their 'hot writes'. The children created their own environment narrative (like our story "Tidy") and then published this to go on our writing display. We are so proud of how fantastic the children's writing is!

In Maths, we have continued to focus on multiplication and division. The children are growing in confidence learning how to times and divide by 2,3,5 and 10.

In Science, we finished our topic on 'Seasonal Change' and looked at Autumn!

In PSHE, we thought about what it means to be 'relaxed', how we relax and why this is important in helping keep our body happy and healthy!

In History, the children became 'talking timelines' and have a brief history on how we learned to fly! The children have shown so much enthusiasm for this topic and remembered lots of key details!

We started our Geography topic 'Why is our World Wonderful?' The children thought about the countries and capital cities in the UK before looking at some key human/physical landmarks within it - e.g. The Giants Causeway / The Tower of London!

In RE, the children looked at the Easter Story.

We had a very busy but brilliant Tuesday this week - which was the highlight for many of us. In the morning, the children walked to the library and in the afternoon, the children's performed their year-group assembly! We were very proud of all the children. The children worked hard practising and put on a great performance, showcasing their Year 2 journey so far!

## Sandpipers and Moorhens

Year 3 have been super busy week! They have really impressed us in working so hard on their reading and maths NFER assessments. We have been blown away with the progress they have made since autumn.

In music, we started our new unit where the children learnt a Vikings chant. We have celebrated Neurodiversity week in school and in the classroom we learnt about equity and equality.

On Thursday, we thoroughly enjoyed our trip to Chester where we were immersed in the Roman Era. The children particularly enjoyed marching to the amphitheatre.

Finally, today, year 3 have amazed us in how fantastic they were in their celebration assembly to parents. They really have made us proud this week!

## Kingfishers and Lapwings

The Year Four children had an absolutely incredible week at Edmond Hall in Shropshire, and we could not be prouder of everything they achieved. From the very start, they embraced every activity with enthusiasm and determination. They tackled challenges like blind line and orienteering with teamwork and focus, they showed real care and responsibility while looking after the animals — including the most gorgeous long-haired, floppy-eared rabbits, the chickens, and even some rather grumpy goats!

One of the highlights of the week was building shelters in the woods. The children worked brilliantly together, using natural materials like leaves to waterproof their creations. These shelters were then put to the test in true Edmond style — with leaders standing on top and water being poured over them! Some held up fantastically well, earning impressive points and plenty of cheers.

Throughout the trip, the children truly embodied the Wheelock values of resilience, aspiration, and respect. They supported one another, pushed themselves outside their comfort zones, and showed kindness and encouragement at every turn. Bedtimes were calm, with very few tears, and it was wonderful to see how settled and happy everyone was.

Most importantly, every single child has come away with memories that will last a lifetime. It has been a joy to watch them grow in confidence, independence, and friendship — a week none of us will forget!



## Kestrels and Red Kites

This week in maths, we concluded our area and perimeter unit and have moved on to look at graphs and tables. We have focussed specifically on line graphs and how to read them. The children have learnt how to plot and interpret key information.

In literacy, we concluded our hot write on Great and the Giants. We have been impressed with their vocabulary and how they have constructed their paragraphs. We have seen some of the best writing this year from the children.

The children have completed their spring term assessments during the last two weeks. They have worked tremendously hard and we have seen some wonderful progress. We will share this with you at parents evening next week. We are very proud of their efforts.

During computing, the children have thoroughly enjoyed creating themes for their levelled games. They have been creative and taken photographs of each other to input into characters. In music, we looked at vocal composition and how to use our voices to create sound to match an image.

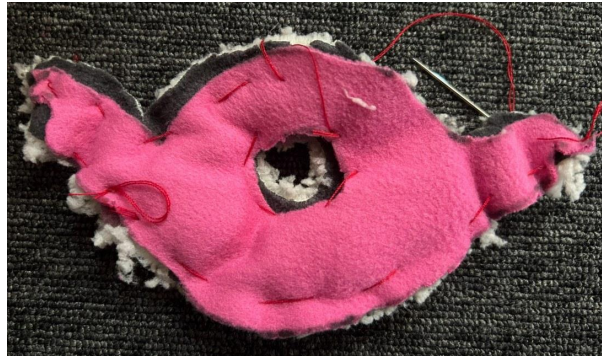

Finally, we ended the week with a church visit. We were very lucky to share the churches input on the Easter story. The children had a wonderful time and were even treated to juice and biscuits. As always, they behaved superbly.

## Eagles and Hawks

Year 6 have had another wonderfully busy week – this half term really is flying by. One of the standout moments has been the children's thoughtful engagement with **Neurodiversity Celebration Week**. The year group have shown impressive maturity and empathy, exploring how our differences make us unique and brilliant. Some pupils researched wellknown neurodivergent figures, while others created acrostic poems celebrating neurodiversity. A special mention goes to **Sophia H**, whose beautiful poem is featured in this week's newsletter.

In **Maths**, the children have tackled a packed programme of work on shape, including calculating the area of triangles and parallelograms. They have also explored volume, applying their knowledge to cubes and cuboids and solving increasingly complex problems.

Over in **Literacy**, Year 6 have been putting the final touches to their blogs about famous Olympians, editing and refining their writing to produce polished final versions.

In **Geography**, they have been investigating renewable and nonrenewable energy sources and learning how energy is traded around the world. Meanwhile, in **French**, the focus has been on daily routines, with pupils building vocabulary and sentence structures to describe their day.

As we approach the end of the half term, excitement is building for what's ahead. This week, the children enjoyed a meeting to go through the itinerary for the **London residential**, and anticipation is certainly growing. Thank you to the parents who were able to attend today's meeting about the trip.
