Class News

Cygnets and Pufflings

The children have really enjoyed exploring our new story *The Storm Whale*. We've been learning new vocabulary from the book, discussing how the characters might be feeling, and sharing our thoughts during class discussions. Building on this, the children have written simple sentences to describe the whale, using their growing phonics knowledge and developing confidence in their writing. In our Maths learning, we have been learning how to use rekenreks. The focus this week has been on subitising – recognising small quantities


without counting – and the rekenrek has helped the children to see numbers in structured ways. We've encouraged lots of visualisation and the use of spatial language to describe arrangements of objects, helping to strengthen their number sense and lay the foundations for future learning. Our topic work has taken us under the sea as we began exploring what lives in our oceans. The children have been fascinated by the different sea creatures we've discovered and enjoyed finding out facts about them. To complement this learning, we've been busy creating beautiful collage art inspired by *The Rainbow Fish. There will be four pieces chosen to represent Reception* and will be part of our upcoming art exhibition. The children have shown so much creativity and care in their artwork – we can't wait for you to see it!

Goldfinches and Woodpeckers

The children have come back ready for our final half term in Year One. In Literacy we have immersed ourselves into our new text, 'The Lost Wolf' by Mini Grey. We were surprised to find WANTED posters in school alerting us to a 'Wolf on the loose'! This caused great excitement and amazing discussion. We have used pictures and sounds to imagine being a hunter in the woods and generated interesting vocabulary to use in a simple verb. adjective, noun poem.

In Maths we have been exploring a hundred square this week and used this to help us locate and write our numbers up to 100. We are very impressed with the children in Maths this week - they have all taken the challenges in their stride. Well done Woodpeckers and Goldfinches.

Today we have had a whole day of art. We looked at the portraits by the artist Paul Klee and have used our creativity to draw and colour our own portraits. We practiced our colouring skills and used a photograph and 2D shapes to plan our picture, then we have used different media to create super portraits. These will now be entered into a cross-trust art competition - Good luck everyone.



Owls and Robins

A fantastic first week back for Year 2!

This week in Literacy, the children have delved into their new book "Rosie Revere: Engineer". The children have: made predictions about the book, considered the main characters emotions and explored new vocabulary.

In Maths, our focus has been fractions. The children have developed their understanding of parts/ wholes and have been recognising and finding halves and quarters!

We launched our new Jigsaw PSHE topic "Changing Me" and were impressed with the children's understanding of different life-cycles.

In History, the children learned more about William the Conqueror - focusing on the types of castles he built.

Lots of thoughtful responses came out of our RE lesson where the children thought about a place that is "special to them". The children confidently described their place, what they did there, what the atmosphere was like and how they feel there. Next week, the children will begin to think about a "special place" for many people who practice Judaism - a synagogue.

Finally, in Art the children have been completing their final piece for our "Map it Out!" topic. This involved using relief-printing to create a colourful map of their journey from school to the Church!

Sandpipers and Moorhens

This week year 3 have started our new literacy unit called 'Into the forest'. As we read the vehicle text, we discovered lots of hidden images of different fairy tales. We have continued learning about time in maths. We would appreciate if you could continue to support your child at home with their progress on time. In science, we have continued our unit on plants. We have enjoyed dissecting flowers to learn about the different parts. We have also learnt about the important role that pollinators play. In PE, we have started learning how to play cricket. In geography, we have reminded ourselves on our knowledge of human and physical features focusing on Sandbach. Today, we have been busy creating our entries for the Whole Trust Art project. We have used skills of blending with oil pastels and art pencils to draw silhouettes.

Kingfishers and Lapwings

Our first week back at school has been a very creative one! We have written our 'How to make Mischief' instructions this week, in line with our class text 'Seen and Not Heard', which has been great fun. We have thought of lots of interesting ways to wreak havoc and create total chaos in a Stately Home - we do hope that these methods are not tested at home! Then, in the afternoons we have completed our cave painting art work, on our cave background, where we drew an outline in a medium of our choice and then use chalks to add hints of colour, drawing on our knowledge of shadows and light and dark, from the start of Year 4.

We have also worked extremely hard this week to create our pavilion structures in DT. We have used various methods such as weaving, cutting, folding, rolling and gluing to create sturdy, colourful pavilions. It was wonderful to see the children in such a creative headspace, designing pools, drinking fountains, beds and gates for their endangered animals to shelter in.

In Maths, we have started the topic of Money. We have been learning about calculating with money, estimating with money and comparing various amounts of money. In History, we have been thinking about why King Alfred the Great was great and why the Anglo-Saxon rule ended. We have debated if some of the sources we used were bias or not, and thought about who we felt would have made the best King after King Alfred. Ask us our thoughts! We have also started our final topic of sound this week, which started with us understanding how sounds are made, and then identifying sounds in our classroom and outside. We have lots of experiments to come in Science this half term, so we are excited to start this new topic!

Next week, all of Year 4 will be completing their Multiplication Tables Check - so we wish them the best of luck and urge them to get in their last few days of practice, although we are certain that they will all do brilliantly!

Eagles, Hawks and Kestrels

Welcome back for our final half term. This year has flown by.

In maths, year 6 have been problem solving. They have been applying their understanding of number operations to support their methods. Year 5 have focussed on decimals and adding/ subtracting them. The children have used their place value to support them.

In literacy, year 5 have been planning their hot writes for a persuasive letter. They have been using their understanding of relative clauses and synonyms/antonyms to help them.

In science, we focussed on magnets. We explored how not all metals are magnetic. The children investigated which materials would be attracted to the magnet. In RE, we looked at humanism and how different people are role models or inspirations for humanists. In PSHE,

we discussed our relationships with technology. We talked about how to be healthy when using technology.

During French, the children created their own planet and wrote about it. They talked about the size, colour, temperature and attractions in it.

The children have been excited to create a piece of art work for our trust exhibition this month. They've used photography to generate images of letters for their names. They edited them and altered the colour or added shadows to them to. They've done an excellent job.

Year 6 have started to plan out their enterprise projects this week. I'm sure they'll be bartering with you to 'borrow' different items from home.

Have a wonderful weekend- hopefully the weather will improve!
