

Science at William Perkin this term



Since Christmas Elite scientist have continued their research into synaesthesia, working with scientists from Brunel University. Using Myndplay Brain Sets they have been scanning their brainwaves whilst taking part in a variety of activities including percussion, origami, writing poetry and dancing. They have also observed the effects of being exposed to various smells and flavours. They have now analysed their results and are producing their poster to share their findings at the IRIS conference next term. The Elite scientists also had a lecture on Sickle Cell Anaemia from Imperial College, a topic they will present on at the Great Exhibition Road Festival.









The science club has continued to do fun experiments and investigations including making lava lamps, crystals, ice cream and bath bombs. They were also the judging panel for this year's Royal society Young People's Book Prize where they had to judge the 6 shortlisted books in four categories; Ease of reading, Interest, Look and Feel and Inspiration. The winner this year is "Where are you really from?" by

Adam Rutherford, a fascinating exploration of evolution and race.

Dr Doyle ran the annual trip to GCSE Science Live at Disneyland Paris, where they listened to talks on how the "science of thrill" is

used to design rollercoasters and how chemistry is used in cosmetics amongst others.





Meanwhile, Y7 enjoyed a trip to the science museum where they were able to get hands-on in the Wonderlab.

Y10s also got to experience the UK version of GCSE Science Live at the Victoria Apollo Theatre where they saw presenta-

tions from very notable scientists such as Lord Robert Winston, Jim Al Khalili and Andrea Sella on topics which ranged from "Is time travel possible" to fertility.

There have been four trips this term for those interested in careers in medicine or dentistry. Y10s went to the Barber Surgeons Hall, an amazing venue, to have a Medical careers carousel with 12 professionals with a variety of specialities. A team of five 6th for-



mers entered "Neurospark: Speaking for Tomorrow: The Health and Earth Challenge" at Imperial College where they had to write and present their own speeches.

The Y12 Medics Scholars took part in a Surgical Skills Workshop at the Royal College of Surgeons where they learnt a number of surgical techniques. They also went to Greenford High School for the student conference on medicine and dentistry.

And just yesterday (02/04/25) Y8 students took part in a STEM workshop all day called Blast Off to RIAT provided by the RAF Charitable Trust.! What a packed, wonderful term!

It has been an exciting time in MFL this term, filled with a number of different activities having been enjoyed by students.





Bertha Earth




Bertha Earth is a youth-centred environmental organisation working with young people between the ages of 11 and 18.
