What should I already know?

Christians believe in the Holy Trinity – God the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. Christmas celebrates the birth of Jesus and Easter celebrates his death and resurrection. There are other important festivals throughout the year such as Lent, Pentecost and Advent. Christians read the Holy Bible and learn through Jesus' teachings about how to live a good life.

What do I need to know? – Key Knowledge

Justice: Justice is where people behave in a way that is fair, equal and balanced for everyone. An example of justice could be allowing all people to vote or ensuring everyone has access to free healthcare.

Fairness: Fairness is where people are treated the same without favouritism or discrimination. An example of fairness might be: turn taking, sharing, playing by the rules, not blaming others.

Charity: Charity is the act of giving help to those in need. Charity is important because it helps those less fortunate in our local community and across the world. The most obvious act of charity is in the donating of money.

Jesus talks about charity in the Bible. See: **Acts 20:32-35**.

Muslims believe that they must help the poor. Giving to charity and helping others are good deeds and Muslims shouldn't expect anything in return. Charity involves giving money but also giving time to others.
