Workplace trends

- Desire to attract more men into the sector, particularly in Early Years where the workforce is over 95% female.
- Teaching remains a position where more staff are needed to fill gaps and to replace those retiring and leaving the profession.
- Specialised roles within the sector such as careers leads can be particularly difficult to recruit and these staff are in high demand across the region.
- Education roles are amongst the most advertised across GM.

Types of qualifications

- Some apprenticeship qualifications are available for teaching assistants and childcare workers.
