# April Fools' Day

April Fools' Day – or 'All Fools' Day' falls annually on the 1st of April and is a time for playing practical jokes on others for fun.

## When Did It Start?

No one really knows for sure when it began, but most think that it started in the late 1500s when the calendar we use today (The Gregorian calendar) was introduced. Some people didn't get the message and were still celebrating New Year on the 1st of April, which is when it used to be. Therefore, some people thought they were foolish.

There are also clues in a famous book called 'The Canterbury Tales' that it could have started in the late 1300s. Others think that it could go back even further as the ancient Romans held spring festivals called 'Hilaria' around that time too; full of merriment at the spring equinox.



## Famous April Fools' Day Tricks

- In 1998, a burger company advertised new 'left-handed' burgers. Thousands of people visited the shops trying to buy them, some even wanted right-handed ones!
- In 1957, even the BBC got involved with a short, spoof documentary about spaghetti trees in Italy. Many people believed it and wanted to know how to grow them at home. The reply was: "Place a sprig of spaghetti in a tin of tomato sauce and hope for the best."

## What Happens on April Fools' Day?

April Fools' Day is a fun time when harmless, but amusing tricks are played on others. Even the television and newspapers get involved so be careful what you read and hear on that day! In Scotland, the victim of a trick is called an 'April Gowk'. A Gowk is the name for a cuckoo, or foolish person in Scotland.

In France, the day is called 'Poisson d'Avril' (say: pwass-on dav-rill) meaning 'April Fish' because on this day people (usually children) stick paper fish to the backs of others (usually adults), so they can walk around looking silly without even knowing.

## Watch the Time...

In many areas, if you try to play a trick after midday, then you become the fool. If you are fooled after noon, you can say:

**"April Fools' has passed and gone, you are the fool and I am none."**
