# Year 6 Lesson Three: Challenging Prejudice and Discrimination

## **Learning Objective**

To realise the nature and consequence of discrimination, teasing, bullying and aggressive behaviours (including use of prejudice - based language, how to respond and ask for help).

## Recap: What are the protected characteristics? What does equality mean?

It means ensuring that every individual has an **equal opportunity** to make the most of their lives and talents. No one should have poorer life chances because of the way they were born, where they come from, what they believe in or whether they have a disability.

Reflect - Why might some of these groups need special treatment?

The Equality Act 2010 protects people from discrimination in the workplace and in the wider society. There are **9 characteristics** that are protected:

- -Race
- -Religion
- -Sex
- -Gender reassignment
- -Age
- -Disability
- -Pregnancy/maternity
- -Marriage/civil partnership
- -Sexual orientation.

Why do you think the competitor was surprised that Jessica was female?








## Let's learn more...

#### What is prejudice?

Prejudice comes from two words: 'judge', which means to make a decision about what should be done, and 'pre', which means 'before'. So, prejudice means when you make a decision about someone before you actually know them.

Prejudice is not a good thing. If someone is prejudiced it means they have negative beliefs about certain groups of people. For example, have you ever heard an older person complaining about 'kids today'? Or a younger person complaining about 'boring grown-ups'? Both of these views could be seen as prejudiced! Not all kids today are naughty and not all grown-ups are boring. These are just negative beliefs that some people have. Of course, some kids can be naughty and some grown-ups can be boring, but that's not true all the time!

Sometimes prejudice is based on no real evidence at all. For example, some people are prejudiced against other people just because they look different, or because they speak differently.

#### What is discrimination?

Discrimination is what happens because of prejudice. It means treating someone unfairly because you don't like something about them. Let's imagine a woman called Mary. Mary thinks that women are better than men. Mary has her own company that makes millions of pounds. She has to find people to work for her because her business is so big. So, Mary holds interviews for jobs in her company. Ten men and ten women apply for the jobs. The men and women are all as good as each other and they could all do the job very well. Mary gives all ten women a job and she doesn't give any men a job! She tells the men they were just unlucky but in her diary she writes:

"Dear diary, today I hired ten women to my company. I didn't hire any men even though they were very good at the job. That's because I just think women are better! I can't wait to have all lovely women in the office and no stinky men!"

Mary has shown **prejudice** by thinking all women are better than all men. She has shown **discrimination** by treating the men unfairly because of her negative beliefs.

Discrimination can take on many different forms. E.g. name-calling, bullying, not employing someone, making assumptions and generalisations.

## So, what types of discrimination are there?

### Here are some examples:

- **Sexism** Treating someone badly on the basis of their sex (being male or female). It is more common for females to experience discrimination at work e.g. men are often paid more money to do the same job, even though it is illegal.
- **Racism -** People are disadvantaged or treated badly based on what they look like (on the basis of their skin colour).
- **Religious discrimination** Treating someone badly because of their religion. Islamophobia and anti-Semitism are examples of people being discriminated against because of their particular religion.
- **Homophobia** treating a gay person badly based on their sexuality (who they are attracted to).
- **Age discrimination** Treating someone badly based on their age e.g. not employing an older person because of their age.
- **Disability discrimination** Treating someone badly because of their disability e.g. not employing someone because they use a wheelchair.

Note that these groups of people are also included in the protected characteristics.

Think back to the **Equality Act 2010...** We all have the right to express our views, feelings and wishes. Does this mean we can say whatever we like? Discuss!

### Reflection

Remember that we **must** respect one another's opinions. Expressing an opinion, if it is offensive and harmful, can be *illegal* if it incites hatred.

Remember there is a difference between having a personal opinion or religious belief, and the law. We must all be respectful and **tolerant** of others. We are all different and that is what makes us all wonderful. Learning about other people, other cultures and other lifestyles is what makes us compassionate and tolerant.

How do you seek support if you feel someone is being treated in a discriminatory way?
