



You could consider: <i>What are they thinking at this point of the story? What would they be thinking after this event?</i> and so on. An interactive way to do this is to have a child freeze frame a character's reaction to part of the story and then have other children take turns to stand behind the child and voice their thoughts. They keep going until they exhaust all ideas.</p> <p>You could also try Passing Thoughts where children pass by a character and speak their thoughts about the character.</p> </div> <div style="border: 1px solid black; padding: 5px;">  <p>Back-to-back mobile phone In pairs, the children sit back-to-back and enact a scenario where they are on the phone to each other. They can be talking about and discussing what they have seen or what the character has experienced or gossiping about the character and what they have been doing.</p> </div>
