What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	68%	Although our attainment in swimming is good we have had limitations put on us due to cost and timings. Children in our school receive swimming sessions in year 4 and 5, which is the most that we can manage due to schedule timings. In our most recent survey of parents, only 50% of children go to the swimming pool regularly outside of school.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	76%	



What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water- based situations?	79%	This skill is prioritised in both year 4 and 5 swimming lessons to ensure the maximum amount of children attain well.
